After we were done eating, several of my classmates and I walked on the paths running through the extensive prairie, and based on the lesson plan, I gave a presentation about prairie soil.



I was a little nervous to be playing the role of the teacher, but it was a very good experience because everyone was very interested in what I was talking about and they were all in high spirits because of the beautiful weather.
