My favorite shirt is a sweater by the brand DIVIDED, sold by H&M. Besides cleaning instructions, it provides the country of production: Indonesia. It also includes the make up of the material: 53% Polyester, 47% cotton. I'm ashamed to say that I am very sceptical about my findings today and didn't consider them before. My sweater isn't local nor organic and that generally is not a good sign.

**Research the impact this item may have had on the people who produced it and the environment. Write down what you find. (max 100 words)**

I checked to see if the product I was wearing is ethically manufactured and an article made by 'goodonyou' says that H&M has made a shift towards sustainability and 'fairer' fashion since their grade of 'B+' in the 2017 Ethical Fashion Report, however they're still not there especially since their low-quality materials still make the items 'disposable'. Next, from the last challenge 'home' I discovered that polyester has been linked to cancer/ hormone imbalances is dangerous to be made into a mattress much less a sweater! The cotton isn't labelled organic therefore, pesticide could've been sprayed on it, killing good organisms around the crop and polluting our soils and rivers.

He was super surprised at the stats I informed him with and how companies like H&M outsource their products from LEDCs to reduce their own costs, selfishly. I showed him the trailer of the 'True Cost' as he got curious to really see how bad the working conditions for these people were. Lastly, I told him about the materials used (polyester and cotton) and he told me he'll pay attention to the detailing on the tag, the next time he buys an article of clothing.
