INSPIRATION FOR THE MODERN YOUTH: Social Environmental Justice Education for People of Color.

Alexia Leclercq, a 21 years old girl that battles climate change as crisis that disproportionately affecting the communities colour and focused on bridging the gap between education and action.

Only at 20 years old, this young lady from Austin Texas had a life-changing experience when she co-founded Start:Empowerment (S:E), an environmental justice nonprofit focused on bridging the gap between education and action.

"Our mission is to use education as a tool to achieve social -environmental justice and liberation for all." - Alexia Leclercq.

LISTEN. CREATE. IMPACT.

S:E collaborates with activists, educators, and community members to create spaces for environmental justice education and action. The group staunchly supports the principles of abolition, transformative justice, and mutual aid.

REACHING OUT AND PUBLIC ENGAGEMENTS

S:E has worked with 7 schools and over 2500 students to inspire the educational institute. Meanwhile, they have reached over 13 000 people by speaking engagement, workshop and guest lectures.

START: EMPOWERMENT have been infusing the elements of environmental justice histories, organizing skills and urban-agro training, and political education frameworks in their mission.

Not only it helps introduces more diverse content, drives student growth, and generates community impact but it also contributes to the building, strengthening, and connecting of various movements in NYC and beyond to the current climate crisis.

"US education continues to erase the stories of marginalized communities, forcing students to navigate a world that instills shame around their identities."

"We've met people who say we don't have to make this all about race but no. The truth is skin color is the number one determinant of how much pollution you live next to so it is important to talk about these conversations that aren't easy, that aren't comfortable."

Education needs to give the students the skills tools.

Leclercq believes that it's important to consider the social and emotional needs of the students and ground the topic in the classroom in the context of real life scenarios happening in the community.

Her courage is highly inspiring.

Being a part of the people of color community, I've experienced my rights being denied in which people refused to listen to my voice and what I have to say. However, to see Alexia being very brave to speak against all norms and stereotypes being pushed on us is something that we all need to have. Not to forget that all her goals and missions are achieved despite being at a very young age of 21 years old!

She has connected with thousands of people, thousands of school kids and their teachers, and these numbers are significant! Just imagine how many hearts she has touched, and how many students she has inspired?

Seeing Alexia Leclercq being comfortable in her league, promoting environmental and social justice with a not-for-profit organization made me realize that if you have the goal to do something, then you should pursue it with all our efforts. People may underestimate you and belittle your fight, but if you know your fight is for a good cause, then it is worth fighting for.

Alexia Leclercq is a truly inspiring young woman and I hope everyone will be inspired by her too. Just like her, we need youth to take actions because they are the leaders of tomorrow, the future of our nation.
