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Why forests are so central to 30*30 goals?

Thirty by thirty refers to efforts by the global community to conserve 30% of terrestrial and marine habitats by 2030. Conserving forests is important to achieve the goal for the following reasons:

- -A lot of people rely heavily on the ecosystem: About $\frac{1}{3}$ of the population has a close dependence on forests or forest products.
- -Forest plays an important role in carbon sequestration. Without forests, the climate change will exacerbate.
- -Forests are the home to thousands of biodiverse species. High biodiversity ensures the ecosystem to function normally and prevents the invasive species.
- -A lot of devastating actions are happening now in the forest: Expanding agriculture, illegal and unsustainable logging, mining, urbanization and climate change.



TAKING ACTIONS

- Plan trees: Reforestation is a crucial strategy to combat climate change. Planting a tree in your backyard can make a big difference!
- Conserve trees: Encourage local governments to take action by signing the petitions and write letters to local officials. If you can, donate money to local environmental organizations or government department.
- Buy forest-friendly products: When you spend your money, avoid buying uncertificated palm oil, beef, soy and other products that come from tropical areas. Look for certifications from Rainforest Alliance, Forest Stewardship council and the Roundtable on sustainable oil.

- Participate outdoor activities: When you visit the natural world by yourself, you have greater inspiration to protect the forests.
